






During the month of July, we will have one Sunday service at 9:30 am, with a mixture of contemporary Christian music and familiar hymns. The 11:00 am service will resume in August.

- Elmer's school glue (4 oz. bottle)
- 5 glue sticks
- standard foot-long ruler
- one pair of scissors
- low odor dry erase markers

Pastor's Paragraphs

On the Fourth of July our nation will celebrate its 247th birthday. Every Independence Day is a celebration of freedom. But as history has shown us again and again. for freedom to endure, it needs to be balanced with responsibility. The founders of our country did that by drafting a constitution that sought not only to preserve their hard-won freedom, but also created a framework for using that freedom to promote the common good.

The Apostle Paul wrestled with the question of freedom and responsibility in his letter to the Galatians. Some people had taking Paul's preaching about God's grace to mean that they were now free to do whatever they wanted. Paul was alarmed that people would take the forgiveness won by Christ on the cross for granted. He saw that some believers were taking that hard-won freedom as an excuse for their own selfish actions.

Paul writes in Galatians 5:13-14, "You were called to freedom, brothers and sisters, only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but use your freedom to serve one another in love. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself."

Love for our neighbor is the compass that guides us toward using our freedom responsibly. Love is central to our calling as followers of Christ. We have been freed from sin in order to serve one another with love. In other words, our spiritual (and our political) freedom ought to be used to pursue the good of our neighbor.

One of the things I treasure the most about our congregation is that we seek to show love for our neighbors in many ways. We do it through the food we distribute each week through the Hope Pantry and the meals we serve through BAT. We do it by offering showers, food and clothing to our unhoused neighbors. We do it by collecting donations of peanut butter and jelly, by sewing quilts for Lutheran World Relief, and by preparing meals for members of our church family who are sick or grieving.

After Paul describes our freedom in Christ he launches into the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol (Galatians 5:22-23). As we practice love for our neighbors and for each other, that fruit will continue to grow and bless our lives as individuals, as a church, and as a community.


Taizé Service

Council Meeting Summary

The Trinity Council met via Zoom on June 20, 2023, at 6:30 pm. Members present: Pastor Kent, Mary Kantola, Karvl Robinson, Mike McMichael, Larry Dodson, Garv Goldberg, Wes Krashin, Theresa Husted, and Stacy Wheeler. Feel free to contact any of the council members if you have any questions. Pastor Kent's devotion used "The Summer Day," a poem by Mary Oliver.

Pastor's Report Highlights:

- The choir is now on a summer break and will resume in September.
- The spider dolly for the piano on loan from CBU has been purchased and installed.
- Other musical and video equipment approved by the council is pending.
- Reverend David Berg will cover for Pastor Kent on New Business: Sunday, July 30.
- · Pastor would like to invite Executive Director of Family Promise, Riverside, Claire Jefferson-Gilpa to speak at a worship service this summer.
- Whiteside Manor has been using Trinity to hold family therapy meetings twice a month, but that ended in June, as they have found a new location closer to their facility.
- Two affordable housing projects have upcoming grand openings. Habitat for Humanity will open transitional cottages at Mulberry Village on June 23, and St. Michael's Apartments open on July 24.

Treasurer's Report:

- The month of May had \$21,523.37 in envelope giving and \$6.857.97 in unrestricted income. Envelope giving in the first five months totaled \$111,543.34, which is \$3,208.34 more than projected.
- May ended with a negative net income of \$2,879.91 for that one month. However, there is a positive net income of \$24,033.21 for the 5-month period of January through May.

Old Business

- Drywall repair in the LSS office is underway and the report showed no asbestos present.
- Church workday will be scheduled for Saturday, July 8, starting at 8:00 am.

- The council approved the use of Poat Parlor for Gamblers Anonymous meetings. The meetings will be held on either Friday or Saturday nights.
- Instead of a regular Synod Assembly in 2024 there will be a series of regional gatherings next May. There is a possibility that Trinity may be asked to host one of them.
- An in-person council meeting is scheduled for July 16 in Poat Parlor following the coffee hour.

The next council meeting will be held in Poat Parlor on July 16, 2023, following coffee hour (about 11:30 am).

Reflection: I Will Give You Rest

The Gospel reading for the Sixth Sunday after Pentecost offers a promise many might crave. In Matthew 11: 28, Jesus says, "I will give you rest." In this passage, Jesus addresses people who are burdened and weighed down by legalistic and oppressive ways. It's also while they're in this oppressive place that Jesus makes his gracious invitation of rest.

But this invitation might seem misleading. Perhaps the promise, "Come to me, all you who that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest" leads you to believe this is about a nice, long sleep. Or maybe rest for you is a free day without anyone around, when you can recline in your special chair and watch your favorite TV show without anyone talking to you during the good parts.

But a nap and watching TV aren't what this promise from Jesus is all about. It was a call for people to depend on Christ, rather than on themselves. Jesus was calling the gathered community to follow him as committed disciples. The same call is extended to us.

Jesus says, "Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me" (verse 29). This call to discipleship, the means by which people find rest, is by walking with and learning the ways of the Lord. This learning isn't just cognitive it's experiential. It's a way of life. It means to learn by asking questions and practicing until the ways of Christ become part of who we are.

The yoke of Jesus is different – it is gentle, it is humble, it is caring. One learns from Jesus by adopting his spirit and living with a focus on those things important to Christ, by engaging in Jesus' mission and ministry. The only time the load becomes overwhelming is when we try to take it over and do the pulling ourselves. Come, all who labor, and the Lord will give you rest. Take on the ways of Christ, learn from him. The burden is light.

To be clear, this invitation of rest isn't an invitation into a life of ease. Following Jesus will be full of risks and challenges, as he has made abundantly clear. Yet, Jesus calls us to a life of humble service, and in that service is a life of freedom instead of captivity.

We are freed to walk with Jesus. Freed to be honest about those ways in which we struggle. Freed to be released from the bonds of sin. Freed to live into the mission of Christ. Freed to love our neighbor as Christ has so beautifully modeled for us. Freed to experience the relief, joy and blessings of life through a grace-filled relationship with our Lord.

When life is yoked to Jesus under God's gracious and merciful reign, free from the burden of sin and the need to prove ourselves, free to rest deeply and securely in God's grace, we find rest.
