The Season of Lent: Lord, Teach Us to Pray

The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on February 14. On Ash Wednesday we will have a special service at 7:00 pm, which will include the imposition of ashes and holy communion. The congregation of Eden Lutheran Church plans to join us for worship on Ash Wednesday, and our congregation is invited to attend the service at Eden on Maundy Thursday. Both churches will have services on Good Friday.

This year our midweek Lenten services will focus on the Lord's Prayer. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus' disciples say to him, "Lord, teach us to pray" (Luke 11:1). In response, Jesus taught them the prayer we call the Lord's Prayer. Each Wednesday during Lent, we will explore the meaning of one part of this prayer. Pastor Kent and Pastor Stephanie from Eden will take turns leading Wednesday soup suppers and a study of the Lord's Prayer at Trinity and Eden.

Lenten suppers at Trinity will begin on Wednesday, February 21, at 6:00 pm (there is no supper on Ash Wednesday). There is a sign-up sheet at church to help with the supper by providing a soup or bread. Mark your calendar and plan to join us for these special times of worship and fellowship during Lent!

Food Pantry Spice and Oil Drive Results

Ed and his disabled wife are senior citizens who live close to the church. On most Wednesday mornings, Ed walks to the Trinity food pantry pulling an old suitcase and signs in as one of our pantry guests to receive a box of food. He places the food in the suitcase and pulls it home. On one occasion when he saw a bottle of cooking oil in his box, he clutched it in his hands, and with a big smile joyfully declared, "Oh! My wife will kiss you for this!" Cooking oil is an item that they do not usually buy with a food budget limited by their fixed income.

The spice and oil drive last month was a tremendous success. By last count, we received a total of 726 items. Thank you for your donations! These are items that the pantry rarely has on hand, and these gifts will be received with expressions of gratitude similar to Ed's elation. Thanks for the continuing generous support of the work that the pantry does in serving our community.

What is Lent?

Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word, *lengten*. This refers to the spring season when the days are beginning to lengthen in the Northern Hemisphere; the darkness of winter is ending and is overcome by the sunshine and new life of spring.

The Lenten season in the church is one of prayerful and penitential preparation for the great festival of Easter. It is a six-week journey from darkness to light – from death to new life – from the desert to Jerusalem – from penitence to pardon – from ashes to Easter. The color of Lent is purple, signifying penitence.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which falls somewhere between February 5 and March 10. It is called Ash Wednesday because of the early Christian practice of marking a person's forehead with ashes (in the sign of the cross) as an outward sign of penitence. The focus is the confession of sins and the imposition of ashes is a sign that we confess and repent of our sinfulness. It reminds us of our own mortality — the fact that we will all eventually die and return to the earth, "ashes to ashes, dust to dust."



There are forty days of Lent (six weeks minus Sundays, which are considered Sundays <u>in</u> Lent but not <u>of</u> Lent) and they are symbolic of the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness. For Jesus it was a time of fasting, temptation, and prayer – preparation for his ministry and his final journey to the cross in Jerusalem. The forty days of Lent can inspire our journey of learning and growing in faith in preparation for the celebration of Christ's resurrection. The focus of the Lenten season is not on the Crucifixion, as that is the theme of Holy Week, but on spiritual renewal and growth. Jesus said, "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain, but if it dies it bears much fruit." (John 12:24)

He was speaking of his own death and resurrection, but his words also carry the promise that if we follow him on the path of discipleship, Christ will lead us from death to new and abundant life. So, embrace the season of Lent as a spiritual springtime for your soul!

Nations shall come to your light. - Isaiah 60:3

At our annual meeting on January 28, I shared how this verse from Isaiah seems especially appropriate when I think about our congregation. In the past year, we have welcomed families from Iran and Ukraine to our church, and an older couple from China has also been attending services regularly — they use an app on their cell phones to translate the words in the bulletin from English into Mandarin! A father and son from Afghanistan recently came to the church office seeking help, and I was able to refer them to a local agency that helps refugees and asylum seekers. Last month, another couple visiting our church told me that they had been looking for a new church for some time, but after attending worship at Trinity, they felt they had finally found their new church home.

Each of their stories is unique, but somehow all of these people found their way to Trinity Lutheran Church. I believe it's because so many of our members are inspired by the love of Christ to welcome newcomers and reach out to people in need of help. Again and again, I have been moved by the generosity and hospitality I have seen demonstrated by members of our congregation.

A couple of weeks ago I received an email from a woman whose son is a senior in high school. He needs to do a senior project that helps the community. She wrote that when she was working at a nearby restaurant, she had gotten to know some of the homeless people in the neighborhood. So, while trying to think of an organization her son could gather donations for, she asked some of them what place they felt helped them most. She wrote, "You [Trinity] were who they named. With rave reviews." Now her son is collecting items to donate to our BAT meals and Thursday shower programs.

Jesus said, "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16) As new people are drawn to our church, we have seen some modest but significant growth this past year in our worship attendance, Sunday School attendance, choir participation, and financial offerings. The growth in each of these areas tells us that people are being drawn to the light of God's love that shines from Trinity Lutheran Church.

That light shines brighter when each of uses our gifts and talents in service to God. I hope that you will think and pray about how God is calling you let your light shine in the coming year! – *Pastor Kent*

Love and Ash

February 14, 2024, will hold two "holidays" that seem to be moving in opposite directions. Valentine's Day is a Hallmark creation dedicated to expressions of love. Ash Wednesday is a time of remembering our finitude; that each of us and all whom we love are impermanent. On the surface these commemorations seem an odd pair. "Bring a date to church and get an ash cross from a person who reminds them that they are dust". I would argue that if we go deeper, they are a perfect pairing.





An ancient symbol for impermanence in the Celtic tradition is the triskelion. It is a circle, sometimes depicted with three legs or waves chasing one another around in an endless cycle. It is meant as a reminder that Spring follows Winter, Winter follows, Fall, and Fall follows Summer. Times of scarcity follow times of abundance. Times of connection follow times of loneliness. It is an echo of Ecclesiastes 3 which sings, "To everything, there is a season and a time under Heaven."

The key to living this fundamental reality in a spiritually heathy way is to not get overly attached to any season or any moment in your history. And yet, to celebrate its beauty to feel deeply and to not deny the power that a moment can have on us. It is a delicate dance between not distancing ourselves from what is happening in our lives, but also remembering that all things fade away. New things arrive daily.

Anyone or anything that we love does not truly belong to us. They are shooting stars that shine brilliantly and then are gone. When they go, they return to the Source; to God. We feel the weight of their empty space and grieve. We also know that this grieving will shape us into a form that will be new for us. The grief we feel is a mirror of the love we shared. The hollow ache is an echo of the heartfelt joy.

One year on Ash Wednesday, I invited the congregation I was serving to a different practice of the imposition of ashes. I traced the ashen cross on the forehead of the first person who came forward and proclaimed the truth, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Then this person turned and did the same to the next person in line. This sequence continued for the whole assembly. Tears flowed when husbands made a black cross on the forehead of their beloved spouses. Voices cracked when parents reminded children that they too would not live forever. As they say, it got real that day!

So, on February 14th we will bear witness to love and impermanence. Some of us will spend time with loved ones. Others will be alone. Some will go to church and receive a cross and a word of remembrance. Others will be unable to bear that this year. No matter what you choose, remember that you are loved in this impermanent form. Please consider a Lenten practice of telling someone that you love them everyday until Easter (and then beyond if it makes you and them happy!) And let us not cling to any season too tightly. Our fragile planet will do another lap around the sun. People will come into our lives and depart. All of it is held in Divine hands.

Let Love Be Genuine

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil; hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal; be ardent in spirit; serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope; be patient in affliction; persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; pursue hospitality to strangers. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another. — Romans 12:9-16

Council Meeting Summary

The Trinity Council met via Zoom Tuesday 1/16/2023. Members present: Pastor Kent, Mary Kantola, Stacy Wheeler, Gary Goldberg, Wes Krashin, Theresa Husted, Karyl Robinson, Larry Dodson, and Mike McMichael. Pastor Kent led a devotional from Christ in Our Home based on John1:43-51 and offered an opening prayer.

Pastor's Report

- We are still seeking nominees for elected positions to be decided at our annual meeting on January 28. Old Business
- As we have done before, the financial donations received at the lunch following the annual meeting should be designated to help with one of our food programs, such as BAT, Thursday Showers, or the Hope Pantry.
- Lutheran Social Services has opened a new Riverside office at 6857 Indiana Avenue. However, they may still want to rent some office space at Trinity. At a minimum, one of their staff will be at Trinity on Thursdays to help people who come for showers. Brenda Lussier and pastor to meet with the LSS Area Director on January 25 to discuss their plans.
- We need to prepare an updated job description for the Administrative Assistant position.
- Lent is early this year. February 14 will be Ash Wednesday, and Easter Sunday will be March 31. This year's mid-week Lenten service will focus on the Lord's Prayer. As we did last year, members of Eden will come to Trinity for our Ash Wednesday service, and we will go to Eden for their Maundy Thursday service. Eden and Trinity will each have a Good Friday service.

Treasurer's Report

- December was completed with \$32,237.14 in envelope giving and \$11,612.95 in unrestricted income.
- For the 2023 fiscal year, we have \$281,262.04 in envelope giving. We are \$26,004.00 over projected

- giving for this year. Regular offerings for the 2023 fiscal year were \$309,262.04.
- We finished December with a net of \$10,511.44. We finished the fiscal year with a net income of \$96,065.06. Please note that this large net is due to the \$30,000.00 from Grace and the \$19,000.00 donated for the air conditioner replacement in December. The actual net for the 2023 fiscal year minus \$49,000.00 is \$47,065.06.

- Job description for the office staff position needs to be updated.
- The proposed budget for 2024 was approved for presentation and a congregational vote at the annual meeting on January 28, 2024.
- Seeking nominations for council positions, audit committee, and synod assembly (1 female/1 male)
- Property updates: Heat pump installations in the office and kitchen were completed. Decision on carpet installations in LSS office on hold pending determination of LSS needs.
- Discussion of potential space needs for LSS. Carpets may be cleaned in LSS small office. Sanctuary carpets were cleaned.
- No actions on Audit Committee recommendations. Additional counters are needed for weekly offering.

New Business

- A proposal from HASCO Heating and Air to repair gutters was presented and approved.
- A proposal was approved to give the donations from the Baked Potato Lunch after the annual meeting to the Shower of Hope program.

The next council meetings will be held in person following the annual meeting on January 28, 2024, and on February 20, 2024, at 6:30pm via Zoom.

The Quilting Bee also needs used sheets, curtains, and other large pieces of fabric to use for quilt backs.


