Bring Hope with a Shower: Support the Shower of Hope Program at Trinity This Month!

Imagine starting your day feeling fresh and clean. Now imagine not having that necessity for weeks, or even months. This is the reality for many people in our community.

To address this basic need, Trinity works with the Shower of Hope. The Shower of Hope is non-profit organization that provides mobile showers for the homeless. A trailer outfitted with 3 showers comes to our church every Thursday. The Shower of Hope program provides a safe and welcoming space for individuals experiencing homelessness to take a hot shower, get clean underwear, socks and clothes, and regain or maintain a sense of dignity.

Working with the Shower of Hope, Trinity provides personal hygiene items and clothing for shower guests. This April, we're asking for your help to ensure everyone has access to a basic need: clean underwear. Here's how you can make a difference:

- Donate <u>New</u> Men's Briefs (Sizes XL, 2X, 3X):
 Fresh, clean underwear is essential for hygiene and comfort. Please note, we are currently only accepting donations of men's briefs in sizes X-large, 2X, and 3X.
- Make a Cash Donation: If shopping isn't convenient, your cash donation allows us to purchase the specific underwear needed.

Every contribution, big or small, makes a significant impact. With your support, we can ensure participants in the Shower of Hope program feel confident and prepared to face each day. Together, we can make a difference!

Pastor's Paragraphs

We are now in the Easter season, and our Sunday Gospel readings tell us of times when the resurrected Jesus appeared to his disciples. At first they were frightened — as if they had seen a ghost. To prove that it really was him, Jesus showed them his wounded hands and side.

Why didn't he just remind them of a story or an inside joke that they shared? It was because his scars were a kind of certificate of authenticity.

What does it mean for Jesus to be known by his scars? I'd guess that most of us have scars, and every one of them has a story to tell. One that I have is on the ring finger of my left hand. The fingernail is a bit malformed as a result of a childhood incident when I had to pry a pet rabbit that we had out of the mouth of a dog that was eager to kill it. After getting the rabbit free, the dog bit down on my finger before I got my hand out of its mouth. Whenever I look at that finger, I'm reminded of that event.

Jesus' scars also tell a story. They paint a vivid picture of his love for all people and his willingness to sacrifice his life in order to save them. His scars tell of his vision of God and of God's kingdom that is just and generous. They tell a story of responding to the jeers of the crowds and the rejection by religious and political leaders with a message of forgiveness. "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34) The scars on the risen Christ are emblems of the life that he lived and the message that he preached.

I have always imagined that when I die, my "resurrected body" will be brand-new and free of the aches and pains I experience now. It's a wonderful hope. But I wonder now if some of our scars might remain, especially those that remind us of our own sacrifices of love and compassion.

Will I still have a misshapen fingernail when I get to heaven? I don't know, but if I do, it will be because God wants me to remember the small sacrifice I was willing to make to save another life. I hope that it will also remind me of the much greater sacrifice and the greater love that God has shown me in my Savior Jesus Christ.

The stories we read in the Bible of the risen Jesus appearing to his disciples tell us that he embraces his scars, and uses them to confirm his identity and comfort his disciples. Richard Rohr says, "If we do not transform our pain, we will most assuredly transmit it." Jesus' scars show us that he transformed the pain he suffered into signs of healing and hope for his first disciples and for believers today. May God grant us the grace to have our scars transformed as well. – *Pastor Kent*

Choir Concert on Pentecost Sunday, May 19, at 6:00 pm

The church, the Body of Christ, was born in diversity. Read what Acts 2:5-11 says:

At that time there were devout Jews from every nation living in Jerusalem. When they heard the loud noise, everyone came running, and they were bewildered to hear their own languages being spoken by the believers.

They were completely amazed. "How can this be?" they exclaimed. "These people are all from Galilee, and yet we hear them speaking in our own native languages! Here we are—Parthians, Medes, Elamites, people from Mesopotamia, Judea, Cappadocia, Pontus, the province of Asia, Phrygia, Pamphylia, Egypt, and the areas of Libya around Cyrene, visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism), Cretans, and Arabs. And we all hear these people speaking in our own languages about the wonderful things God has done!" They stood there amazed and perplexed. "What can this mean?"

In many ways, our church's choir is similar to the people gathered in Jerusalem on that Pentecost morning. Different people, with different kinds of voices, some low, some high, coming from different kinds of backgrounds, some students, some teachers, some professionals, all of us uniting in song to sing "about the wonderful things God has done!"

So, it's fitting that our church will celebrate Pentecost this year with a concert presented by those of us who sing in our choir. We'll be joined by friends who play orchestral instruments to accompany us. If you were able to come to one of our Christmas concerts, it will sound and feel similar to that, but with music that praises God more about the great things he does for us throughout the entire year. We're calling this celebration concert, *Our Grateful Praise*.

Also joining us to sing as a special guest soloist will be singer/songwriter, Jon Byron, composer of the song "We Are the Family of God." Jon has been a good friend of Glenn Pickett's since 1989. Glenn has helped Jon produce five albums,

and together, they have presented concerts with each other in places as far flung as Greece and Turkey, and as close as here in Riverside. Glenn will be writing arrangements for Jon, the choir and orchestra that will enable us all to musically sing praise "about the wonderful things God has done!"

Council Meeting Summary

Trinity's Council met on March 19, 2024, at 6:30 pm via Zoom.

Members present: Pastor Kent, Gary Goldberg, Mike McMichael, Wes Krashin, Sue Rogers, Karyl Robinson, and Brenda S. Lussier. Absent: Peggy Fryc and Cherie Guillow.

Pastor Kent led prayers and a reading from the Lenten devotional booklet, *Gathered into One*.

Pastor's Report

- CROP Walk: Trinity had 11 people participating as walkers, plus Dennis and Sue Rogers, who handed out water at Trinity. A total of 84 people from 10 church groups participated in the walk.
- LSS Update: They plan to have the LSS office at Trinity open Monday-Friday. They also plan to open a second office on Indiana Avenue. LSS will no longer be renting the smaller office as of April 1. They will continue to use the larger room for their office at Trinity.
- Lenten Services: Our Wednesday soup suppers have been well-attended, with about 24 people each week.
- Choir Concert: There will be a special choir concert for these projects. on Pentecost Sunday, May 19, at 6:00 pm.

- Day Camp: Brenda contacted LRCC, and we have scheduled day camp for the week of July 15-19.

Treasurer's Report

In February we received a total of \$19,286.41 in envelope giving and \$6,440.40 in unrestricted income. After deducting expenses, we finished February with a negative balance of -\$272.52.

The plan is to bring all bids for review at the next council meeting on April 16, 2024, followed by a vote for approval at a congregational meeting. A congregational meeting for the presentation and vote on these property maintenance projects is scheduled at 10:30 am on Sunday, April 21. Sufficient funds are available in our savings to pay for these projects.

The meeting adjourned at 7:58 pm with prayer. The next Council meeting will be on April 16, 2024, at 6:30 pm.

Sunday School Teachers Wanted


