The Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath tradition developed in Germany. The circular shape of the Advent wreath and the evergreens traditionally used to make it symbolize eternal life. One candle is lit each Sunday during the four weeks before Christmas. The meaning given to each candle may vary from place to place, but they usually symbolize hope, peace, joy and love. On Christmas Eve, a white candle in the center of the wreath is lit, symbolizing the light of Christ. The candlelight symbolizes the coming of Jesus as "The Light of the World."

Pastor's Paragraphs

My family recently adopted a dog from a local shelter. Before that adoption happened, we had to get things ready at home. We had to make sure that we had a dog bed and toys and treats and food and... the list went on and on! For several weeks, my wife searched several different dog adoption websites and visited animal shelters, looking for the "right" dog — one who would be a good fit for our household. One not too big, not too old and not too young, preferably female. It took several weeks, but she finally found a dog that checked all the boxes. After filling out the paperwork and paying the adoption fee, we brought our new dog home to live with us. All the preparation we did to get ready was well worth the effort. She's a wonderful addition to our family.

Now we are approaching the season of Advent. In some ways this season reminds me of the experience of looking for a new dog. Advent is a time to get ready. We need to prepare in order to be ready when the time comes. So, we decorate our home and we search for the right presents. We decorate the church and set up the Advent wreath, counting the weeks until Christmas. We are getting ready to celebrate the arrival of the One who will bring us joy.

But Advent is also more than just getting ready for Christmas. It's about something much bigger than the arrival of a new pet. Advent draws our attention to the future. The season begins with a message of <u>hope</u> the promise that Christ will return and the earth will be renewed. We do not know when that day will be, so we need to be ready at all times. Remember the words of John the Baptist: "Prepare the way of the Lord!"

The kind of preparation John had in mind involves more than getting our house ready. It means we need to get our heart ready for the One who is coming. We need to get our life in order, too. Then, when that great day finally comes, we will be ready to welcome the joy that it

will bring. When that joy comes bounding toward us, it will be a joy greater than any furry friend can provide.

It will be a joy that's eternal.

Gallons of Love 2024 Update! Amazing News!!!

(One of our projects on our Sunday of service in September was assembling packets of stationary that will be included in the "Gallons of Love" gift bags. Here's a recent update on this ministry to prisoners.)

Gallons of Love – Christmas for Prisoners is proud to announce that more that more that more than ten percent of prisoners incarcerated in California prisons will be given a bag of Christmas cheer in 2024!

The Gallons of Love (GOL) Christmas for Prisoners ministry has experienced phenomenal growth in the last three years, due in great part to the active support of ELCA churches of the Pacifica synod. We celebrate the expansion of this ministry, as well as all those who have/will be contributing, putting all the bags together and delivering these packages of love to the dear ones.

GOL provides one-gallon zip lock bags filled with stationery, hygiene items, single serve beverages, a personal message handwritten on a postcard, and two very important mini chocolate bars, to prisoners in Southern California prisons. 1,200 Gallons of Love were distributed in 2022 to the women incarcerated at the California Institution for Women in Chino. Last year that number tripled to 3,500 Gallons of Love as the ministry was expanded to include the California Institution for Men, also in Chino. This year we anticipated expanding to 6,500 Gallons of love with the inclusion of the California Rehabilitation Center in Norco. However, administration staff at California State Prison Los Angeles County (in Lancaster) heard of this ministry and begged for their 3,200 men to be included also! After a scramble for funds, goods, and laborers, Gallons of Love will now be reaching 9,500 prisoners in 2024, which is more than ten percent of those incarcerated by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

GOL coordinator, Rev. Dr. Linda Barkman, is a Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) social justice pastor who was herself incarcerated for thirty years and personally knows how important it is for a prisoner to receive a token of love and kindness. The humanizing touch of Christ's love in such a dehumanizing place is often life changing. This ministry would not be possible, however, without the ecumenical support of many partners. ELCA churches have been particularly helpful in preparing stationery and gallon bags at their "God's Work/ Our Hands" events as well as in purchasing needed articles through Matthew 25 and Thrivent grants. In addition to the generosity of ELCA Lutheran partners of the Pacific Synod, GOL gratefully acknowledges Disciples of Christ churches in the Pacific Southwest Region, St. Peter's by the Sea Presbyterian Church, Testimony Ministries, friends at the Fullerton Universalist Unitarian congregation, and the Anti-Recidivism Coalition.

Churches and individuals can participate in this amazing ministry in many different ways. GOL needs volunteers to write personal messages of care and love on postcards. Donations of money, stationery supplies, and other goods are always needed and appreciated. GOL is hoping for one to two hundred volunteers to participate in the actual packing of the Gallons of Love on **Saturday, December 7**, from 10 am until finished, at the Fellowship Hall at the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) Regional Offices in Fullerton (Wilshire and Harbor Blvds.) where a chili and cornbread lunch will be provided.

Council Meeting Summary

The meeting was called to order by Gary Goldberg at 6:30 pm on Tuesday, November 19. Members present: Gary Goldberg, Karyl Robinson, Pastor Kent, Cherie Guillow, Wes Krashin, Michael McMichael, Sue Rogers, Brenda S. Lussier, Larry Dodson. Members absent: Peggy Fryc. Guests: Glenn Pickett and Lee Lyons.

Pastor's Report

- The Al-Anon group that had been meeting on Fridays decided to disband as of October 25.
- The holiday rummage sale on November 2 raised a total of \$1,200.61. The proceeds will go to the Hope Food Pantry at Trinity.
- Ann Herring received the Volunteer of the Year award at the Lutheran Social Services Gala, which was held at the Mission Inn on November 8. She and her team of volunteers were recognized for their faithful service of providing monthly Sunday dinners to the LSS homeless shelter in San Bernardino.
- The church will be decorated for Advent and Christmas on November 30.
- We will have two services on Christmas Eve, at 5:00 pm and 10:00 pm.
- The "I Care Shelter Home" has decided to close and sell their property after more than 40 years of ministry in Riverside under the leadership of Rev. Sherry Sweetman.

Treasurer's Report

The church finances are in good shape. Brenda is working on the budget proposal for next year. She should have it done by our next meeting to present to the council.

Old Business

- Property Maintenance: Sanctuary roof and gutter work Dan's Roofing had 30 days to respond to our lawsuit; ten days remain. No official response from the company yet. If they don't respond in the specified time, they will be in default. We are delaying repair of the gutters until we know what will happen with the roof.
- Sanctuary Lighting: Lee Lyons attended to answer any questions we may have about the lighting proposal. He is a professor at CBU who teaches about theater lighting. This proposed system will not replace our current system but complement and improve the overall lighting. He addressed all questions to everyone's satisfaction.

• Website Update: The individual we had hoped to hire for this is no longer available. We are going to contact other churches about who they used for their websites.

New Business

- Copier Lease: Our current lease is up. We received a quote from a different copier company with a potential cost saving of \$1,200.00 a year. It will take up to 90 days to end our current service after cancelling. Motion approved to change from our present company, Visual Edge, to Valley Office Equipment.
- Carillon Replacement: We need a new electronic system for the bell tower. We received a quote to purchase a Chime Master LX digital carillon for \$4,250.00, plus tax and shipping. Motion approved to purchase this unit.
- Deacon Call Committee: Brenda S. Lussier will finish her seminary studies in December. We need to form a committee to prepare for calling her as a Diaconal Minister for Trinity. A motion to form this call committee was approved. Gary Goldberg volunteered to chair this committee and Karyl Robinson volunteered to serve on it. We want to have a total of four people on this committee – two from the council and two more from the congregation. This committee would be responsible for determining the needs of the church, how the applicant meets those needs, and the salary package. Once a proposal has been prepared, the decision to issue a call would require a congregational vote. The earliest this vote could occur would be in February.
- Annual Meeting Plans: The annual congregational meeting will be on Sunday, January 25, 2025. We will have one service at 9:30 am with the congregational meeting immediately following to approve the budget and elect council and committee members. A baked potato lunch will be served after the meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 8:27 pm. The next council meeting will be on Tuesday, December 17, beginning at 6:30 pm on Zoom.
