Karyl Robinson, President Kelly Krashin, Vice-President Cherie Guillow, Secretary Brenda S. Lussier, Treasurer



Pastor's Paragraphs

Unless you've been living on a desert island, you know that there has been a lot of turmoil in the news lately. Writer Diana Butler Bass says that, at a recent meeting with a group of faith leaders, Rev. Traci Blackmon offered a reflection about hope and resilience in the midst of the current political confusion and uncertainty. "Every day," she said, "I look at a photograph from a house in Los Angeles. Although it was surrounded by complete devastation from the fires, with entire neighborhoods wiped out, this one house remained."



Focusing on this image strengthened her hope. The house — like the few others that survived — employed fire-resistant technologies and building techniques intended to do exactly what they did — not burn down in spite of the fire raging around it. One firefighter remarked, "This house was perfect; it was built for this. Not all homes are built like that."

This house was built to withstand a firestorm. It reminded Rev. Blackmon of Jesus' words in Matthew 7:24-27, "A wise man built his house on rock. The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on rock. But everyone who hears these words of mine and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man who built his house on sand. The rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell — and great was its fall!"

For Jesus and for Rev. Blackmon, the house represents our life. Have we built it with the strength to endure the storms that life inevitably brings? Do we have a firm foundation that won't be washed away by a flood of bad news? Do we have a faith strong enough to endure the fires that threaten to burn everything down?

I pray that you will take steps now and in the days to come to strengthen your faith. If you build your life upon the solid rock of Christ, you will have the strength to withstand whatever storm may come your way — and maybe to shelter your neighbor, too. – *Pastor Kent*

Presiding Bishop Eaton's Pastoral Message on Executive Orders

January 24, 2025 Dear church,

On Monday, January 20, our nation witnessed the peaceful transfer of power central to our democracy, followed by sweeping actions by the incoming Trump administration. Facing such changes, we receive guidance through Martin Luther's words in the Large Catechism.

In the fourth petition of the Lord's Prayer, where we pray "Give us this day our daily bread," Luther writes about the importance of praying for our leaders, asking God to grant them wisdom and strength. He also speaks to the responsibility of leaders to provide stability, sufficiency and equity, saying, "[I]t would be very proper to place in the coat-of-arms of every pious prince a loaf of bread instead of a lion, or a wreath of rue, or to stamp it upon the coin, to remind both them and their subjects that by their office we have protection and peace, and that without them we could not eat and retain our daily bread." (*The Book of Concord*, Kold and Wengert, eds., page 450.)

This past week has been one of rapid and cascading change, from the inauguration of a new president and vice president to the flurry of activity in government orders and regulations. The policies and decisions reflected in this week's executive orders and regulatory changes have the potential to profoundly impact our lives, the well-being of our neighbors and the future of the planet. Therefore, I am concerned about the ways that many of the executive actions have created uncertainty and fear in our communities among neighbors struggling to survive, neighbors struggling to provide for their children, and neighbors struggling to be seen.

As a church, we are called to speak up when the government distorts or denies the image of God in each person by endangering access to protection, peace and daily bread. Where harm or inequity occur, we are called by God to respond with love and advocacy.

Luther also writes that in asking for daily bread, we are to pray for our leaders. We should pray that they act wisely and justly, protect all people and not cause harm.

Prayer is not passive; it's an act of hope. Prayer reminds us to ground ourselves in God's promise. We pray for strength, to love unconditionally and to serve one another. As we lift up our petitions, we must also act—advocating for policies that affirm the dignity of every person and standing against actions that demean or exclude.

This church is committed to upholding the humanity of everyone, regardless of who we are or where we come from. We are a church called to love our neighbors and accompany all people in their joys and struggles. We must remain steadfast in this calling. As the ELCA, we will continue to proclaim the radical inclusivity of Christ's love. And we will deepen our local and global partnerships with those working to build a just and compassionate society, especially through our ecumenical and interreligious networks.

I commend to you the social message "Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Discipleship in a Democracy," which states on page 7: "To evaluate how well agencies of government are doing their proper work of providing for the safety and well-being of those within their borders and/or jurisdiction, Lutherans ask one simple but all-encompassing question: Is the neighbor being served?"

I encourage our congregations to use the resources of the ELCA Witness in Society Team with advocacy networks on the state and federal level. And get involved with AMMPARO, the ELCA's strategy toward just and humane policies affecting migrants.

As we move forward, let us hold fast to our faith and to one another. Let us be bold in our witness to the gospel, steadfast in our prayers for those in authority and tireless in our efforts to seek justice for all.

May God grant us courage, wisdom and peace in these days.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order on January 21 at 6:32 pm by Gary Goldberg. Members present: Peggy Fryc, Pastor Kent, Cherie Guillow, Larry Dodson, Sue Rogers, Gary Goldberg, Karyl Robinson, Brenda S. Lussier, Mike McMichael. Member absent: Wes Krashin.

Pastor's Report: See attached report. We have received a donation of two life-saving medical devices: an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) and a device to help choking victims. We need to decide where to keep them and how to train people to use them properly.

Treasurer's Report: See attached report. Brenda S. Lussier presented the financial reports. Major highlight of the report are: All bills have been paid, we have \$321,306.83 in our savings account, and our net income for 2024 is \$70,376.96.

Old Business:

- Property Maintenance & gutter work: We are presently in negotiations with Dan's Roofing regarding the damage on the sanctuary roof. They do not have insurance to cover their warranty.
- Website Update: We are currently waiting for a proposal from a company that specializes in websites for churches.
- Deacon Call Committee: Gary Goldberg has agreed to chair this committee. We would like two representatives from council and two from the congregation. Brenda will meet with the synod's Candidacy Committee on Thursday, January 30, for the approval interview needed to become a deacon. Pastor Kent made a motion to have Karyl Robinson and Peggy Fryc represent the council and Gary Goldberg and Beth Houlihan represent the congregation.

New Business:

Annual Meeting Nominees for Elections:

Three people are going off of council. Those going off are Gary Goldberg, Wes Krashin and Mike McMichael.

 Slate of candidates for council are: Gil Heth, Kelly Krashin, Shawn Lowell. Karyl

- Robinson has agreed to serve another term.
- Slate of candidates for Audit Committee: Nancy Willis is going off and Helga Stafford has agreed to take on her position.
- Slate of candidates for Endowment committee: Carolyn Bolz and John Collins are willing to serve a second term, and there is one more opening.
- Slate of candidates for Scholarship Committee: All are willing to continue on this committee: Peg Bradley, Karen Clarke and Gretta Merwin.

Karyl Robinson made a motion to accept these slates of candidates for the above positions. Peggy Fryc seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Pacifica Synod Assembly: It will be held in Dana Point, May 16 to 17. We are allowed to send one man and one woman. We will take nominations from the floor at the annual meeting.

Other Annual Meeting Details: The meeting will be held in the Sanctuary on January 26 immediately after the 9:30 service. We need at least 50 members to attend. Karyl will be in charge of the sign-in sheet. Following the meeting we will have a baked potato lunch in Heinecken Hall.

Social Concerns Report: In December we received a \$1,000.00 grant from the Pacifica Synod for our blessing bags.

Adjournment and Closing Prayer: Pastor closed with a prayer. The meeting adjourned at 8:09 pm.
